- Benne, Mae. *Principles of Children's Services in Public Libraries*. ALA, 1991. Ref 027.62. A resource of professional principles and managerial competencies for the children's librarian. A classic that is still relevant.
- Cerny, Rosanne, Penny Markey & Amanda Williams. *Outstanding Library Service to Children: Putting the Core Competencies to Work*. ALA, 2006. Ref 027.62. Examines the seven core competencies that The Association for Library Service to Children (ALSC) has listed for children's librarians. Explains all of the core competencies, gives examples of how to use them, and includes a bibliography for further study.
- Dresang, Eliza T. *Dynamic Youth Services Through Outcome-Based Planning and Evaluation*. ALA, 2006. Ref. 025.1. How to gather information, determine outcomes, and evaluate programs and services.
- Fasick, Adele M. *Managing Children's Services in the Public Library*. 2nd ed. Libraries Unlimited, 1998. Ref 027.62. A practical guide to children's librarianship.
- Harper, Meghan. *Reference Sources and Services for Youth*. Neal-Schuman, 2011. Ref 027.52. How and where to direct students for productive research.

Walter, Virginia A. *Children & Libraries: Getting it Right*. ALA, 2001. Ref 027.62. Ideas and suggestions to help libraries better serve children. Analyzes popular trends such as homework assistance and parent interaction.

Bauer, Caroline Feller. *Celebrations: Read Aloud Holiday and Theme Book Programs*. H.W. Wilson, 1985. Ref 027.62. Sixteen theme programs based on holidays and events. Every program includes suggestions for books, poems, recipes, games, projects, exhibits, etc.

Champlin, Connie. *Storytelling with Puppets*. 2nd ed. ALA, 1998. Ref 372.66. How to use puppets to add to story hours. Includes ideas on what puppets and techniques will work best for a particular book. Will be helpful for all levels of puppetry.

Chupela, Dolores. *Ready, Set, Go!: Children's Programming for Bookmobiles and Other Small Spaces*. Alleyside Press, 1994. Ref 027.62. Programs for preschool to grade 3 that can be done in small spaces.

Cook, Sybilla. *Battle of the Books and More: Reading Activities for Middle School Students*. Alleyside, 2001. Ref 027.8. An excellent resource for ideas on contests and competitions to motivate students to read.

- Crepeau, Ingrid M. and M. Ann Richards. *A Show of Hands: Using Puppets with Young Children*. Redleaf, 2003. Ref 371.39. Demonstrates how to use puppets to help children develop social skills. Includes lesson plans and patterns to make puppets.

Explains how to start a reading group for elementary and middle school students. Has program ideas for each age, and includes suggestions on how to ensure each program is a success. Includes everything from choosing a space, to developing a programming style, to dealing with latecomers.
