- The joint webinar with IMLS and CDC had the most specific advice for libraries and librarians

 - In addition to stating that paper is not a material that will keep a virus alive, David Berendes, an epidemiologist at the CDC said that any survival was noted in ideal lab conditions, not real world conditions. They recommend good basic hygiene and quarantining books for a 24 hour period before touching them. Also included in the summary (and recording) are recommendations about having signage inside the building and plenty of cleaning and disinfecting supplies on hand.
