The Department of Libraries publishes statistics collected from public libraries, available in Excel and PDF formats. Data is published in the spring and covers libraries' fiscal years ending prior to November of the previous year. The PDF Biennial Report compares library funding and other statistics to statewide and national averages. The PDF pre-sorts libraries by population; using the Excel data, one can generate reports grouping libraries by operating income, per capita tax support, or other categories
