#### Geographic Naming Petition: Vermont Board of Libraries

#### Location:

Bumblebee Brook drains an area of Shelburne, Vermont,(attached map) between Spear Street to the east and the LaPlatte River to the west, from Irish Hill Road to the south and Cedar Ridge Drive to the North.

#### **History and Features:**

There are seven ponds along the one-mile course of this brook. Five are earthen, and two constructed by beavers. As well, there are several wetlands and marshy areas. Water flows through the brook year-round, ranging from an impressive torrent after a heavy rain, to a willful trickle after a long summer's drought.

Along the shores of the brook are open fields, marsh, wooded areas of cedar, maples, willow, oak, and many other species of trees. Beaver, otter, deer, fox, bobcat, a variety of frogs, turtles, racoons, squirrels, chipmunks, and many more animals thrive in the habitat the brook provides. Some of the birds observed include, green and great blue heron, barred owl and great horned owl, pileated woodpecker, and a wide variety of songbirds. A myriad of wildflowers are frequented by many pollinators, and hummingbirds.

#### Reason for proposing name:

The Bumblebee watershed is appreciated by local residents, but recently a new walking trail that crosses Bumblebee Brook was added to provide access to the LaPlatte Nature Trails from Irish Hill Road (see map). This particularly picturesque ravine is where the brook plunges through rocky outcrops and waterfalls down to the LaPlatte river. The trail now has frequent hikers that appreciate the falls of the brook as it joins the river, so it seems that it deserves a name despite its relatively small size.

After considering many possible names, acknowledging local residents, historic features such as the mill at Shelburne Falls where it joins the LaPlatte, the historic town dump and pig farm, but it was decided to honor a local fauna, since the alliterative sound Bumblebee Brook is as delightful as the brook itself.
