# Summary

Emmie is gritty in more ways than one. Not only is she strong, fierce, and independent, she's also not afraid to get literal grit in her elbows while pursuing her chosen sport: she's an aspiring extreme wheelchair athlete. She was born with spina bifida, but took her parents at their word when they said that she can do anything other kids can do. In order to truly compete, though, she needs a new wheelchair. Emmie is earning money through her own home business - but when some well-meaning community members learn of her goal, Emmie struggles with how and when to accept help, while remaining true to herself.



# Summary

When Mac and friends discover that their classroom reading copies of Jane Yolen's *The Devil's Arithmetic* have phrases blacked out, they protest – and find themselves up against teacher Laura Sett, who believes that "I am here to protect all of us from the ugly world." As the kids battle censorship, they also find themselves confronting questions about the nature of truth and the importance of standing up for oneself.

### Social Studies

While book censorship in many states is now an issue in the news, attempts to ban books are far from new. Mac's small town has passed rules and regulations to create an ideal community: they've banned junk food and Halloween, enforced curfews, and decreed that all houses be painted white. Research the history of utopian communities – and try to design one of your own. Now might be a good time to read Lois Lowry's *The Giver*.

Mac objects to the ways Columbus's arrival in America and the story of Thanksgiving are taught. Do you think he's right? Can you come up with other examples in which history might be more truthfully represented?

What's real? Aaron, for example, is convinced that the Earth is flat. How is reality defined – and how do the different characters in the book see it?

### **Discussion Questions**

Should some books be banned? Why or why not?

Do you feel that sometimes adults don't tell you the truth? Are there times when kids *shouldn't* be told the truth?

On page 101, Mrs. Sett tells the kids: "You'll learn, as you grow up, that adults in your life seem to be doing things you *think* are wrong, but we're really helping you." Can you think of examples of this? Do you think she's right?

Are there times when you shouldn't follow the rules? When and why?

One of the protest signs in the book reads "If you're comfortable learning history, it's the wrong history." Do you think this is true? Can you think of some examples?

What does Mac mean on page 232 when he says "Some battles we lose. Some battles we win. And some battles aren't ours to fight."?



# Summary

Coraline meets Alice in Wonderland in this spooky tale. Evie Von Rathe and her aunt, Desdemona, live in Blight Harbor – the seventh-most-haunted town in America. When Desdemona disappears in the town's creepy abandoned slaughterhouse, it's up to Evie to face her fears (and breathe through her anxiety), confront a murderous ghost, and rescue her aunt from the supernatural Clackity.



## Summary

Annabelle is fascinated with Bailey, but as their friendship progresses, why is Annabelle's father being so weird about it? Why does the presence of one preteen have such an impact on him and other community members? Annabelle is open to learning and willing to lead the way to a more inclusive town, a town with room for different kinds of fruit.



Until the unthinkable happened, Kofi spent his carefree days swimming in the river Offin, playing oware with his grandfather, and trying to avoid his bully of a cousin. Kofi had been warned by his family to be careful around the water at night and that there are "Things about the water that you don't know," but one night Kofi ignores their warnings and goes for a late-night swim - and this mistake sends him on a journey of no return. This novel in verse is the first in a trilogy, starting in the West African Asante Kingdom of Ghana. Kofi's journey will draw you in and break your heart - but this is a story that must not be missed.

### **Curriculum Connections**

Themes: Family, food, storytelling, identity, love, fate vs. free will, coming of age, betrayal vs. loyalty, courage, tradition.

# Social Studies/Geography

Kofi is approaching age 12 and there are many references to the ceremonies surrounding boys as they come of age in their community. Can you think of ceremonies that exist for boys and girls of similar age in the US? What are they and who celebrates them? What do they represent?

While the villages of Upper and Lower Kwanta are fictional, there is a River Ofin in Ghana and the Door of No Return is a real place located in the Elmina Castle on the Cape Coast. Pull up a map of Ghana, find the town of Elmina and find Elmina Castle. As you move North and slightly West, you will be in the region of Upper and Lower Kwanta. Approximately how far would it be from the start of the river Ofin to the coast?

Food, an important part of culture, makes an appearance throughout the book and is always a favorite topic for Kofi. He is either begging his mother to stop making yams or begging her for more of his favorite, Red Red sauce and plantains. Find out if yams and plantains are still staple crops in this region. And what is Red Red sauce? Does it really exist and if so, how is it made?

What have you learned about Europe or European colonization? What do you think about what you have been taught? Do you think you've been told the whole story?

Investigate and compare colonization in West Africa and the Americas. Set up a graphic organizer and research answers to the following questions:

Who were the groups colonized?

Who were the groups doing the colonization?

What areas of life were impacted - for example, education, language, family structure, religion, clothing?

What natural resources were exploited?

How did the government change?

How did the land "ownership" change?

## Math

In the book, Nana Mosi is often found playing the game oware. You may have played the same "pit and pebble" game under a different name. According to historians, this may be one of the oldest games in the world. See what you can find out about where it is played, what it is called, and how the game changes from place to place. If you have the game, take it for a spin!

Kofi mentions the dundun or talking drums several times. Talking drums have a rich history starting in Africa and they are still played today. Find out what is so unique about them and why they were outlawed for use by slaves in the U.S.

## Summary

As the daughter of Japanese immigrants, Annie Enoway has been raised to dream big – of starring roles in the theater, for example, or of taking her basketball skills to the NBA. But when Annie is passed over in favor of her best friend Jessica for lead roles in *Annie* and *The King and I*, her faith in her dreams begins to falter. Soon she finds herself navigating changing friendships, racial bias, and the opinions of others about what she can and cannot do as an Asian-American girl. Come cheer Annie on as she chases her big dreams in this inspiring coming-of-age story.

# **Discussion Questions**

Annie's teacher, Mrs. Olds, has been known to make sexist remarks favoring the boys and belittling the girls during their math class. If you were in this class, what are some actions you could take to combat this blatant sexism?

While visiting a new Japanese-American doctor for Annie, Annie's mom reads an article in *Time Magazine* about overachieving Asian whiz kids. Soon her heart is set on Annie going to medical school and Annie is afraid that her dreams of the stage or NBA might not be as secure as she thought. How does Annie feel when she finds out that her mom does not support her dreams? How is Annie handling her dreams of acting or playing basketball vs. her parents' dreams of her becoming a doctor or a mathematician?

Annie remembers her mother's stories about her pride in graduating from college and becoming a flight attendant - but, as the years went on, her mother became more withdrawn, shy, and reserved. It is only when she meets Mrs. Wright (Kent's mom) that things begin to change for Mrs. Inoue. What happens and why?

Annie and Jessica have been best friends since they were little girls and as the story opens, it seems that they still are. But soon cracks begin to form in their friendship. When do you first notice a shift in their relationship? If you could give Annie friend advice, how would you help her navigate this tricky time? Have you ever had a friend drama that had to be handled gently?

Why do you think there is so much tension between Jessica and Natalie?

How is Natalie a more supportive friend to Annie than Jessica is?

Annie has a very different relationship with her two parents. How is she with her mom? In what ways are they similar or different? What about her dad? How do you think that dynamic affects the parents' relationship?

At the beginning of the novel, Annie is blissfully unaware of any micro-aggressions directed at her or her family - but as time goes on, she begins to have a sense of things that just don't feel or sound right. Mrs. Kelly can't pronounce her mom's name so just calls her Jackie, and tells her mom that she "looks like a doll" in her kimono. Community members treat the Enoue family ethnicity as interchangeable. When does Annie start to recognize subtle and blatant racism in her friends and community?

### **Discussion Questions**

The time on the Oregon coast with his dad could have been a time for Jeremy and his dad to reconnect during the divorce. How are Jeremy's dad's behavior and actions standing in the way of their forging a closer relationship? Why do you think Jeremy's dad acts the way that he does?

Evan has a very positive relationship with his grandmother. Why do you think he feels so comfortable with her? What does his grandmother say or do to help Evan know that it is safe to share with her?

Why do Jeremy and Evan choose specific birds for their secret language? Why do they feel that they need a secret language?



## Summary

Set in a rich, Thai-inspired fantasy world. Twelve-year-old Sai could have a bright future if she sticks with her job as assistant to Paiyoon, the Mangkon Royal Navy's Master Mapmaker -but Sai has secrets. Born into poverty with a conman for a father, Sai constantly struggles to keep her origins a secret. When Paiyoon and Sai are asked to join a mapping expedition to the Southern Seas, Sai sees an opportunity to change her luck - but will have to decide who to trust and what sacrifices she is willing to make to chase her dreams.

### **Curriculum Connections**

Themes: Family, fate, redemption, colonialism and privilege.

### Social Studies

Create a map of the Great Southern Continent including the names Sai chose for the places she and Bo stayed: Sandflea Beach, Destitution Harbor, Starvation Point, and Deathfall Cove. Remember that Sai was trying to make the Sunderlands sound unappealing to others trying to journey there. Can you make your map look like a place people would not like to visit?

Colonialism is a central theme of this book. The powerful island of Mangkon has taken over all the surrounding islands, exploiting their resources and degrading their environments. Choose a country that has been a colonizer. Who did they colonize? What did they gain? What was the effect on the colonized country? What was the impact on their language and culture? Discuss the wide-ranging effects of colonialism as seen in the real world and in the book.

### Language Arts/Creative Writing

At the end of the book, Sai comes to some understanding about her father and the choices he made about her care and upbringing. She searches for him but is unable to find him. Craft a fictional letter that Sai might write to her father now that she understands his motivations.

Project ahead 10 years. What is life like for Sai and Bo?

The slake that Sai and Bo encounter is a dragon-like creature. Choose a medium in which to create a slake or another mythical sea monster like Champ or Nessie.

## **Discussion Questions**

Why is Sai saving every penny to escape her only living relative, her father, Mud?

How is Master Paiyoon a mentor to Sai? What does he teach her? What does he value about her? Explain why Sai thinks Paiyoon is overlooking important information on the maps during the sea journey. What is he really doing and why?

In Mangkon, how does status impact a person at a young age? What's the significance of a lineal? What does it mean for a person to have many versus very few (or no) lineals? What would a lineal mean to Sai? How would it have made her life different? Is there anything in our culture that is similar to lineals?

Which character did you connect with the most? Why?

Master Paiyoon introduces Sai to the idea that Mangkon exploits other countries and strips them of resources. What are his examples? Why is he worried about the possibility of finding the Sunderlands? Why does he think the word "discovery" is used incorrectly? Can you think of examples of this in the real world? Discuss his comments on page 200 and relate them to Sangra's description of Mangkon as "an empire of cowards and thieves" (page 277).

Bo says to Sai, "It's not easy keeping up a lie day in and day out" (page 197). What lie is he talking about? What does Sai know about keeping up lies for a long time? Talk about the lies, deceits, and secrets of various characters, including how Rian deceives others. What are some of the reasons that the characters lie? Discuss Sai's ability as a forger. How is forgery a form of deceit?

After Sai raises the alarm about Bo pickpocketing, she feels bad about snitching. She hears her father's voice saying, "Loyalty, Sai. Even a dog knows how important it is" (page 127). What does loyalty mean, and why does it matter? What is the relationship between loyalty and deceit? When else does it come up in the story? How do the adult whales show a form of loyalty to the captured baby whale?

Summary

Spending the summer in Last Chance, Minnesota, where her grandparents run the Golden Palace Restaurant, was not what Maizy Chen had hoped for. She and her family are the only Asian-Americans in this small midwestern town. During her poker-playing sessions with her dying Grandpa (Opa), Maizy learns about the historical challenges that have faced Chinese immigrants - and that are still on-going. When Bud, the restaurant's iconic bear statue, is stolen and then vandalized with hate speech, Maizy finds unexpected friends in Last Chance as she investigates the crime. This story reminds us that a caring community can overcome the hateful words and actions of a few - and that there's always room for food and celebration.

Maizy's curiosity is piqued about her family's history by the photographs of young Chinese men in the office of the restaurant. The expression "a picture is worth a thousand words" exists for a reason. immigrants. Choose one of the photos from the exhibit, list questions that you would ask this person about their experiences, and discuss what you can infer about their life from the photograph and/or words shared.

### **Discussion Questions**

Maizy and her grandfather spend a lot of time playing poker together. He uses the game to teach Maizy some life lessons by using poker as a metaphor for life. What are some examples of the lessons that he teaches Maizy through the game of poker? How do they apply to her life?

What meaning does the bear statue in front of the Golden Palace restaurant hold for Maizy's family and the community? Can you think of a statue, building, or piece of public art that is meaningful for your family or community?

When the bear statue was first stolen, who did you suspect and why? Were you correct? If not, were you surprised about the actual person who stole it and why?

Maizy figures out a way to put her own fortunes into the fortune cookies for specific customers. What is the purpose of the fortunes that she writes? How do customers respond to them? Can you think of a fortune that you would write for a friend or family member?



For Lady Whimsy and Aunt Cathryn, Safia's adventure kit is a "reminder that whenever you feel sad or lost in this big world, you'll always have a home. And people who love and support you." How do you define home? What items represent your home?

Summary

Victory. Stand! is the graphic memoir of athlete and activist Dr. Tommie Smith. Even as a child, one of fourteen born to a sharecropping family in rural Texas, Smith was a competitive runner. As a teen, he was recruited by prestigious colleges willing to offer him a place on their team, but not the privileges or even basic necessities offered to other students. To compete in the 1968 Olympics, Smith and his fellow black athletes faced death threats and violence – and they would return home to poverty and oppression. All leads up to the iconic act of resistance that took place on that year's Olympic podium and the price Smith and teammates paid for taking their stand. This gripping story serves as a call for continued work toward racial justice.

## **Discussion Questions**

The very first page of *Victory, Stand!* puts us on the starting line of the 1968 Olympics with Dr. Tommie Smith. Injured and facing death threats, Tommie waits for the starting pistol in the race that could put him on the Olympic podium. Why do you think the authors chose to start the story at this high pressure moment?

As the story continues, we jump back and forth to the moments in Tommie's life that show how he got to that Olympic track and to that state of mind. Was this an effective way of telling his story? Why or why not?

Who and what were the biggest positive influences on Tommie's life? Who were the people that actively supported and inspired him? Why were these people so important?

On page 18, Tommie says "Our bodies are programmed to do what we train them to do. Muscle memory, consistency, routine." He credited these training methods with helping to make him a better athlete. How can these same habits be used to train ourselves to be courageous? How can we use them to combat racism?

Consider Tommie's father. What were some of his concerns about his son becoming an athlete? Why do you think he felt this way?

Return to page 73, where Tommie mentions what he considers "the most important race of his life." What made this race so important? What changed for Tommie when he won?

On page 100, Tommie talks about 1963 as a year of violence, but because news arrived slowly, or not at all, he was unaware of much that was happening across the nation. In the age of social media, we have the ability to photograph, record, and share information much more quickly. In what ways does this help or hinder our ability to protest, connect, and make change towards racial justice?

It took courage to dissent and raise a fist, and Tommie knew that he risked his career, his life, and the safety of his loved ones to do so. What formative moments do you think Dr. Smith drew courage from while he stood on the Olympic podium?

How does it change your perspective when you learn about the violence, threats, and sacrifices Black leaders faced when they fought for civil rights? How does the context of Dr. Smith's story change the way you view modern athletic activists?

"We had to be seen because we were not being heard." Why are the actions of Black athletes so integral to the Civil Rights Movement? When Tommie was interviewed about why he raised a fist, he was asked "Do you think you represent all black athletes in doing this?" Was this a fair question? If you could go back in time and interview Dr. Smith in that moment, what question would you ask?



# Summary



# Summary

Hero! That's what everyone called Jack Bailey the day he dove into flood waters to rescue twin toddlers. To Danny Timmons, Jack Bailey seems fearless - always brave and kind despite losing his mother at an early age and living with an abusive father. When Jack, beaten and injured, is taken in by Danny's parents, he regales Danny with tales of Yonder - a land of peace and plenty where rainbow-colored jewel birds fill the sky. When Jack goes missing, Danny searches for answers, suspecting everyone from the town bully to Jack's father and even the Town Sheriff of hiding the truth. With Jack gone and Danny's father off to fight in World War II, Danny must find his own strength to face injustice – and to form his own opinions of what it means to be a hero.

### Language Arts/Creative Writing

When we meet Danny, Jack has just gone missing. The story Danny tells jumps through time, as he looks for clues in his own memory to find where Jack might have gone. Danny's memories, written in italic font, help to fill in the story that led up to the desperate moment of Jack's disappearance.

Try your hand at something similar!

Write a story in past and present tense. Start your story in the present, describing a fraught moment when you needed to make a tough choice. Then take a jump back in time! How does a past experience influence or guide the decision you make in the here and now?

## **Discussion Questions**

What is the definition of the word *yonder*? How does the title resonate as a theme of the story?

*Yonder* is set in Appalachia during the Second World War. How does what's happening in the war overseas affect daily life in Foggy Gap, North Carolina?

Danny comes to the conclusion that "courage starts at home." Think about characters like Lou, Jack, Mrs. Musgrave, Danny, and his mother. Can you point to a time when each character made a choice they regretted or acted out of fear or anger? How about a time when each character showed courage?

Danny is shocked that the librarian who sends him a birthday card each year refused the Musgraves entrance to the library. How does this information change Danny's world view and his impression of the town he lives in?

If you were Lou, would you forgive Danny for telling Bruce that her brother had run away to escape the front lines? Why or why not?

At the beginning of chapter 39, Danny says he thought that he and Jack had courage in common, when what they actually had in common was fear. What does he mean?

On page 144, Danny's mother tells him that yonder isn't a place, it's a direction. She means this literally, but by the end of the story, Danny decides that the statement was apt in more ways than one. Can you think of more than one way that this sentence could be interpreted?

Think about the last image Danny has of Jack. What was Jack doing? How does this relate to the theme of the story?

On page 329, Danny states that "Courage takes practice." What does he mean?

In the first pages of *Yonder* (see p. 6), Danny states: "Even now, after all this time, I'm still trying to figure out which one this is. A hero's story, or a story without a hero." Having finished the book, which do you think is true?
