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GREEN MOUNTAIN SAMPLER

This list, the 7th edition of a Department of Libraries bibliography originally published in 1973, includes children's books about Vermont, Vermonters, Vermont-related subjects or with Vermont settings.

Most of the books listed were published as juvenile titles; however, a few adult books have been included for their obvious interest or reference use to children, e.g. the poetry of Robert Frost and books by Ronald Rood.

This is <u>not</u> a selected, recommended bibliography, but rather a complete listing of books on the subject owned by the Vermont Department of Libraries. Many of the books listed are out-of-print, and available only through libraries. For those that are in print we have not indicated cost since prices change so rapidly.



PICTURE BOOKS AND EASY READERS

Arnosky, Jim. Mud Time and More: Nathaniel Stories. Addison Wesley, 1979.

In this wordless book, the illustrations show the adventures of Nathaniel as he solves four perplexing problems.

Arnosky, Jim. Nathaniel. Addison-Wesley, 1978.

The humorous aspects of a man's reclusive life in the country are revealed in three picture stories and two letters.

Avery, Kay. Wee Willow Whistle. Knopf, 1947.

When Ellen goes walking with her Grandfather, he carves a whistle for her and she plays for all the animals they pass.

Azarian, Mary. A Farmer's Alphabet. Godine, 1981.

Handsome woodcuts of the alphabet and rural themes inspired by this illustrator's Vermont experience.

Bromhall, Winifred. Mrs. Polly's Party. Knopf, 1949.

Mrs. Polly loves having parties with the children and animals, especially her sugar-onsnow party.

Bruchac, Joseph. Fox Song. Philomel, 1993.

After the death of her Indian great-grandmother, Jamie remembers the many special things the old woman shared with her about the natural world.

Budbill, David. Christmas Tree Farm. Macmillan, 1974.

Explains how Christmas trees are grown in Vermont.

Carrick, Carol. The Highest Balloon on the Common. Greenwillow, 1977.

The yellow balloon tied to Paul's wrist helps his family locate him when he is lost on the Craftsbury town common on Old Home Day.

Carrick, Donald. *The Deer in the Pasture*. Greenwillow, 1976.

When hunting season comes, a deer who has become too friendly with people must be frightened and driven away for its own protection.

Christelow, Eileen. *The Five Dog Night*. Clarion, 1993.

Cantankerous Ezra keeps rebuffing his nosy neighbor Old Betty when she tries to give him advice on how to survive the cold winter nights, until she finally discovers that his five dogs are his private source for warmth.

Christelow, Eileen. The Great Pig Escape. Clarion, 1994.

Bert and Ethel try raising pigs on their farm, but when they get to market the pigs have disappeared.

Christelow, Eileen. The Great Pig Search. Clarion, 2001.

Bert and Ethel go to Florida to search for their runaway pigs and find them in unexpected places.

Cunningham, Linda. *The Copper Angel of Piper's Mill and How She Saved Her Town*. Down East, 1989.

The special copper angel weathervane on top of the church inspires the small Vermont village to bring their town back to life.

Davies, Jacqueline. Tricking the Tallyman. Knopf, 2009.

In 1790, the suspicious residents of a small Vermont town try to trick the man who has been sent to count their population for the first United States Census.

Ehrlich, Amy. Parents in the Pigpen, Pigs in the Tub. Dial, 1993.

All of the farm animals move into the house and after several problems the humans move to the barn. After a while the humans get bored and the animals get lonely and they decide to switch back.

Fleischman, Sid. The Hey Hey Man. Atlantic, Little, 1979.

In this original folk tale set in Vermont, a thief steals a farmer's gold, but is outwitted by a mischievous wood spirit - the Hey, Hey Man.

Frost, Robert. *Stopping by Woods on a Snowy Evening*. Dutton, 1978. Susan Jeffers' illustrated version of the famous poem.

Gauch, Patricia L. Aaron and the Green Mountain Boys. Coward, 1972.

In this easy reader, Aaron dreams about helping the Green Mountain Boys through bravery and fighting, but has to be content with helping to bake bread to feed them. Based on a real incident.

Gibbons, Gail. The Missing Maple Syrup Sap Mystery. Warne, 1979.

Mr. & Mrs. Mapleworth try to find out who is stealing the maple sap they are gathering to make maple syrup.

Haas, Jessie. Hurry! Greenwillow, 2000.

A young girl helps her grandparents get the hay in before a rainstorm ruins the crop.

Haas, Jessie. *Mowing*. Greenwillow, 1994.

Nora helps her grandfather mow the field by watching for animals in the tall grass and warning him to circle the horses and mowing machine around them.

Haas, Jessie. No Foal Yet. Greenwillow, 1995.

Nora and her grandparents wait for their horse Bonnie to have her foal.

Haas, Jessie. Sugaring. Greenwillow, 1996.

Nora wants to find a way to give the horses a special treat for helping her grandfather gather sap to make maple syrup.

Harris, Kathleen McKinley. The Wonderful Hay Tumble. Morrow, 1988.

In this delightful tall tale, a young Vermont farmer has all his chores done for him by a huge rolling pile of hay.

Huneck, Stephen. Sally's Snow Adventure. Abrams, 2006.

In this fifth book about Sally, a black Labrador, she goes on a vacation to a dog-friendly ski lodge.

Isaacs, Anne. Pancakes for Supper! Scholastic, 2006.

In the backwoods of New England, a young girl cleverly fends off the threats of wild animals by trading her clothes for her safety.

Jackson, Woody. A Cow's Alfalfa-Bet. Houghton Mifflin, 2003.

An alphabet book with country scenes.

Jaspersohn, William. *The Two Brothers*. Vermont Folklife Center, 2000.

Heinrich and Friedrich, two brothers in Prussia in the 1880s, travel separately to America and end up working on adjacent farms in Vermont.

Kill, Vivian. Crazy Jane. My Little Jessie Press, 2004.

A driving mare stops at the same place in the road every day until the family tricks her with a pretend snake.

Kinsey-Warnock, Natalie. *A Christmas Like Helen's*. Illustrated by Mary Azarian. Houghton, 2004.

Presents a descriptive list of all the things required to have a Christmas like the author's grandmother had, including farm animals, stories of Scotland, ice skating in the moonlight, and joining friends, family, and neighbors at church on Christmas Eve.

Kinsey-Warnock, Natalie. A Farm of Her Own. Dutton, 2001.

Ten-year-old Emma spends a wonderful summer with her cousins, great aunt, and great uncle on their Vermont farm.

Kinsey-Warnock, Natalie. From Dawn till Dusk. Houghton, 2002.

This look at life on a family farm is based on the author's own memories of growing up in the Northeast Kingdom.

Kinsey-Warnock, Natalie. Nora's Ark. HarperCollins, 2005.

During the Vermont flood of 1927, a girl and her grandparents share their new hilltop house with neighbors and animals.

Kinsey-Warnock, Natalie. When Spring Comes. Dutton, 1993.

A child living on a farm in the early 1900s describes some of the activities that mark the approach of spring.

Kinsey-Warnock, Natalie. Wilderness Cat. Cobblehill, 1992.

In the 1770s when Serena's family moves to Canada from Vermont, Moses the cat is not allowed to go along.

Kivlin, Barbara. *ABC's of Vermont*. Barbren Publications, 1987. An educational coloring book about the Green Mountain state.

Lange, Willem. *John and Tom.* Vermont Folklife Center, 2001.

When John has an accident while cutting logs in the Vermont woods, Tom, the Morgan horse who is his work partner and friend, uses intelligence and strength to rescue him.

Lind, Janet. *The Bird at Bear Mountain*. Vermont Migrant Education Project, 1988. When Raymo is six, his family moves to a new job on Rudy Kane's farm. One day, Raymo spots a white bird and chases it to the neighboring farm. After the owner, Lester Flood, teaches Raymo to use a camera, he takes a picture of the bird and his teacher hangs it on the bulletin board at school.

Lindbergh, Reeve. The Visit. Dial, 2005.

Two sisters visit their aunt and uncle in the country and enjoy all the sights and activities.

London, Sara. Firehorse Max. HarperCollins, 1997.

Grandpa Lev controls his music-loving ex-fire horse by playing his violin.

Low, Elizabeth. Mouse, Mouse, Go Out of My House. Little, Brown, 1958.

Toby and his Aunt Bee clean out her country house and in the process chase various animals out of the house.

Low, Elizabeth. Snug in the Snow. Little, Brown, 1963.

When Jamie and his Aunt Kate close up the summer cottage he feeds all the leftover food to the animals. Then it snows and they must stay an extra day with no food until Jamie remembers a pumpkin he had saved.

Medearis, Michael. Daisy and the Doll. Vermont Folklife Center, 2000.

Daisy, an eight-year-old black girl living in rural Vermont in the 1890s, is given a black doll by her teacher and becomes uncomfortable that her skin is a different color from that of her classmates, until she finds the courage to speak from her heart.

Moses, Will. Silent Night. Philomel, 1997.

One snowy Christmas Eve, a Vermont community makes preparations for the holiday as well as for the arrival of another Christmas miracle. Includes the text of the Christmas carol "Silent Night."

Paterson, Katherine. Marvin One Too Many. HarperCollins, 2001.

When Marvin refuses to go back to his new school because he is the only one in his class

who cannot read, his father decides to help him learn by reading with him.

Paterson, Katherine. *Marvin's Best Christmas Present Ever*. HarperCollins, 1997. Marvin wants to make a great Christmas present for his parents that will last forever.

Paterson, Katherine. The Smallest Cow in the World. HarperCollins, 1991.

Though Rosie is the meanest cow in the herd, five-year-old Marvin is inconsolable when she is sold and he and his family move to another dairy farm.

Pearson, Tracey Campbell. *The Storekeeper*. Dial, 1988.

Based on the general store in Jericho, this depicts a typical day there.

Pearson, Tracey Campbell. Where Does Joe Go? FSG, 1999.

Because Joe's Snack Bar (in Jericho, Vermont) closes for the season, the townspeople speculate where Joe goes for the winter.

Purdy, Carol. Least of All. Macmillan, 1987.

A little girl in a big farm family teaches herself to read using the Bible, and shares this knowledge with her brothers, parents, and grandmother during a long, cold Vermont winter.

Rossiter, Nan Parson. Sugar on Snow. Dutton, 2002.

Two boys help their father collect sap and boil it into syrup and then get to eat sugar-onsnow at the end of the day.

Rossiter, Nan Parson. The Way Home. Dutton, 1999.

Sam and his father rescue a goose tangled in a fishing line and take care of her while she heals and her mate supervises. Eventually they fly away, but return in the spring with five goslings.

Rush, Ken. What About Emma? Orchard Books, 1996.

Sue's father can no longer afford to be a dairy farmer, so they sell off the cows, except Emma, who they will keep until she calves.

Schubert, Leda. Here Comes Darrell. Illustrated by Mary Azarian. Houghton, 2005.

Throughout the seasons in northern Vermont, Darrell helps his neighbors with snowplowing, supplying wood, and excavation work, never finding time to fix his own barn, but when a windstorm passes through town, he finds his kindness to his neighbors returned.

Thomas, Abigail. Lily. Holt, 1994.

Lily, a dog that likes everything in its place and the same activities every day, is scared and upset when moving men come and take everything away.

Thomas, Eliza. The Red Blanket. Scholastic, 2004.

A woman flies to China to adopt a baby girl, PanPan, bringing clothes and a red blanket for the baby. The first night in the hotel she uses the red blanket to comfort PanPan, and

as she gets older PanPan carries the blanket with her everywhere.

Tripp, Nathaniel. Snow Comes to the Farm. Candlewick, 2001.

A young boy and his brother sit outside with a fire to watch a winter storm start.

Tudor, Tasha. Corgiville Fair. HarperCollins, 1971.

Chronicles the events of the Corgiville Fair, especially the foul play by Edgar Tomcat in his attempt to win the goat race.

Walter, Mildred Pitts. Alec's Primer. Vermont Folklife Center, 2004.

A young slave's journey to freedom begins when a plantation owner's granddaughter teaches him how to read. Based on the childhood of Alec Turner (1845-1923) who escaped from slavery by joining the Union Army during the Civil War and later became a landowner in Vermont.

Watson, Nancy D. Sugar on Snow. Viking, 1964.

A delightful tale of maple sugaring from tree to the sugar on snow party.

Wells, Rosemary. Waiting for the Evening Star. Dial, 1993.

Growing up between 1909 and 1917, Berty enjoys the slow-rolling wheel of time on his Vermont farm and cannot understand his older brother's desire to see other parts of the world.

- Abrahams, Peter. Reality Check. HarperTeen, 2009.
 - After a knee injury destroys sixteen-year-old Cody's college hopes, he drops out of high school and gets a job in his small Montana town, but when his ex-girlfriend disappears from her Vermont boarding school, Cody travels cross-country to join the search.
- Allen, Merritt P. *Flicker's Feather*. Longmans, 1953.

 Duff meets adventure and grave danger with John Stark and Robert Rogers.
- Allen, Merrit P. *The Ghost of the Glimmerglass*. Harper & Brothers, 1928. Eighteen-year-old Pell Fielding tries to make a living at logging after his great-uncle leaves him two hundred acres of pine timber.
- Allen, Merritt P. *Green Cockade*. Longmans, 1942. Hall Stonebridge, a member of the Green Mountain Boys, fights for his land and home.
- Allen, Merritt P. *Raiders' Hoard*. Longmans, 1936.

 Joe Bangs and Philip Lake, teenage residents of St. Albans, try to solve the mystery of the newcomer in town.
- Allen, Merritt P. *Wilderness Diamonds*. The Century Co., 1932.

 Roger Grant, sixteen, and his friend David Spear find adventure on the Long Trail when they open a store for hikers.
- Alvarez, Julia. *Finding Miracles*. Knopf, 2004.

 Fifteen-year-old Milly Kaufman is an average American teenager until Pablo, a new student at her school, inspires her to search for her birth family in his native country.
- Alvarez, Julia. *How Tia Lola Came to Stay*. Knopf, 2001.

 Although ten-year-old Miguel is at first embarrassed by his colorful aunt, Tia Lola, when she comes to Vermont from the Dominican Republic to stay with his mother, his sister and him after his parents' divorce, he learns to love her.
- Alvarez, Julia. *Return to Sender*. Knopf, 2009.

 After his family hires migrant Mexican workers to help save their Vermont farm from foreclosure, eleven-year-old Tyler befriends the oldest daughter, but when he discovers they may not be in the country legally, he realizes that real friendship knows no borders.
- Anderson, Grace Neil. *In the Shadow of Cox Mountain*. Academy Books, 1993. Chronicles events from 1773-1782 through the experiences of William Cox, his wife Beulah and their daughters when they move to Pittsford.

Anderson, M.T. The Game of Sunken Places. Scholastic, 2004.

When two boys stay with an eccentric relative at his mansion in rural Vermont, they discover an old-fashioned board game that draws them into a mysterious adventure.

Andler, Kenneth. *Mission to Fort #4*. Regional Center for Educational Training, Lyme, NH, 1975.

Fifteen-year-old David Bradford is caught up in the events of the Revolution when he goes to live with his uncle in New Hampshire.

Armstrong, Jennifer. Steal Away. Orchard, 1992.

In 1855, two thirteen-year-old girls, one white and one black, run away from a southern farm and make the difficult journey north to freedom, living to recount their story forty-one years later to two similar young girls.

Arnosky, Jim. Little Champ. Putnam, 1995.

Bobby and Gina visit their grandparents on Lake Champlain and learn about the legendary monster that supposedly inhabits the lake.

Asch, Frank. Up River. S&S, 1995.

Two boys participate in the Otter Creek River Cleanup and spend the day seeing wildlife while they collect trash.

Ashley, Robert P. *Rebel Raiders: A Story of the St. Albans Raid.* Winston, 1956. The south's desperate effort to loosen the northern stranglehold during the Civil War.

Avery, Kay. All for a Horse. Crowell, 1955.

Stories of children with a Vermont village background.

Avery, Kay. Goodbye Blue Jeans. Washburn, 1963.

Susan and her two friends start a newspaper in their town and use it to try to gain access to a swimming pond, and to motivate the town to clean up their river.

Bacon, Katharine Jay. Finn. S&S, 1998.

Unable to speak after his parents and sister are killed in a plane crash, sixteen-year-old Finn comes to stay with his grandmother on her Vermont farm, where his friendship with a neighbor, the activities of local drug dealers, and the actions of a hybrid wolf force him to deal with his grief.

Bacon, Katharine Jay. Pip and Emma. Atheneum, 1986.

Twelve-year-old Pip and his younger sister Emma find the summer spent with their grandmother in Vermont affecting them in different ways as they share both pleasant and unpleasant experiences and adventures.

Bacon, Katharine Jay. Shadow and Light. McElderry, 1987.

Fifteen-year-old Emma looks forward to spending the summer on her beloved grandmother's Vermont farm, but is devastated to learn that her grandmother is fatally ill

and wants Emma to help her live her last months in peace and dignity.

Bailey, Arthur Scott. *The Tale of Muley Cow*. Grosset & Dunlap, 1921. Farmer Green gave his oldest and favorite cow, Muley Cow, to his son when he was old enough to milk her.

Bailey, Arthur Scott. *The Tale of Nimble Deer*. Grosset & Dunlap, 1922.

Nimble Deer, a new fawn, lives near Farmer Green and interacts with animals on the farm and in the woods.

Bailey, Carolyn S. *Homespun Playdays*. Viking, 1941.

Contains the story "Heart for Bethia" in which an old-time sugaring-off party is Bethia's reward for proving that girls can help shovel away the snow to clear the road for the trading team.

Betancourt, Jeanne. *Crazy Christmas*. Avon, 1988.

Aviva must cope with her divorced parents' two families, a trip to New York, the problems of her best friend, and a Christmas split between the two families.

Betancourt, Jeanne. *Puppy Love*. Avon, 1986.

A child of divorced parents, eighth-grader Aviva has to deal with her two families, a new baby brother, grief over her dog's death, a crush on an unattainable boy, and a troubled schoolmate who turns out to be a really good friend and strong support.

Betancourt, Jeanne. *The Rainbow Kid.* Avon, 1983. When ten-year-old Aviva comes home from camp to find her parents have separated, she is afraid that instead of being a two-family child, she'll be a two-bedroom, no-family child.

Betancourt, Jeanne. Turtle Time. Avon, 1985.

Aviva is annoyed when her mother's boyfriend, George, moves into the house with them. She also gets a pet turtle from Josh to keep at her father's apartment and deals with the death of her dog, Mop.

Betancourt, Jeanne. *Valentine Blues*. Avon, 1990.

Aviva struggles to deal with problems in both homes and faces the toughest problem when her parents ask if she would like to live at one house full time.

Blair, Cynthia. *The Candy Cane Caper*. Fawcett, 1987.

Seventeen-year-old twins, Christine and Susan, are sent to stay with their grandparents in Ridgewood near Montpelier while their parents go on a second honeymoon. While there, the girls discover that the Ridgewood Children's Hospital may have to close due to lack of funds, so they throw a bazaar to raise money to try to save the hospital.

Blegvad, Lenore. Kitty and Mr. Kipling. S&S, 2005.

In 1892, eight-year-old Kitty learns about writing and the world beyond her Dummerston, Vermont, home when she befriends her new neighbors, author Rudyard Kipling and his family, who have recently arrived from England.

Bowen, Gary. *The Mare's Nest.* HarperCollins, 2001.

A traveling artist learns that animals are disappearing at the farms he visits. When a widow brings her famous white livestock to a county auction and it rains, everyone discovers that their animals were disguised with whitewash.

Bradbury, Bianca. Laughter in Our House. Washburn, 1964.

When Eileen Lannon suffers a nervous breakdown, her two children, Gilly and Emmett, buy a house on Lake Champlain and move there for the summer to help her recover.

Brashares, Ann. Forever in Blue: The Fourth Summer of the Sisterhood. Delacorte, 2007. The fourth book in this series about four friends who share a special pair of jeans follows them over the summer between their freshman and sophomore years of college. Tibby goes to New York, Lena to Greece, Bridget to Turkey, and Carmen to the Village Summer Theater Festival in Vermont.

Bromhall, Winifred. Mrs. Polly's Party. Knopf, 1949.

A sugar on snow party beautifully illustrated for the youngest readers.

Bruchac, Joseph. Hidden Roots. Scholastic, 2004.

Although he is uncertain why his father is so angry and what secret his mother is keeping from him, eleven-year-old Sonny knows that he is different from his classmates in their small New York town.

Bruchac, Marge. Malian's Song. Vermont Folklife Center, 2006.

The story of a seven-year-old Abenaki girl and her family during the French and Indian War.

Bryant, Louella. Black Bonnet. New England Press, 1996.

As they near the end of their journey to freedom along the Underground Railroad, twelve-year-old Charity and her sixteen-year-old sister Bea encounter additional perils.

Budbill, David. Bones on Black Spruce Mountain. Dial, 1978.

Seth's & Daniel's camping trip to a lonely mountain top becomes a journey into a painful past that Daniel must confront.

Budbill, David. Snowshoe Trek to Otter River. Dial, 1976.

Three short stories in which Daniel and Seth practice their survival skills in the Northern Vermont Woods.

Butler, Cynthia. *Michael Hendee*. Regional Center for Educational Training, 1976.

Captured by the Indians during a raid on their Vermont settlement during the Revolution, a 7-year-old boy and his companions wait for the right time to escape.

Cameron, Eleanor. *To the Green Mountains*. Dutton, 1975.

Fifteen-year-old Kathryn Vaughan Rule desperately wants her mother to move them from their town in Ohio to Vermont, where her grandmother lives.

Canfield, Dorothy - see Fisher, Dorothy Canfield.

Carlson, Melody. Viva Vermont! Zonderkidz, 2008.

As Mrs. Carter becomes increasingly distracted by General Harding, her boardinghouse girls find more opportunities to get into trouble, especially during a weekend getaway to a luxurious Vermont ski lodge, to which some of the girls have invited boys.

Carty, Margaret F. *Christmas in Vermont: Three Stories*. New England Press, 1983. Three Christmas stories about Christmas magic and Christmas spirit.

Cheney, Cora. The Doll of Lilac Valley. Knopf, 1959.

A whole summer as a fresh-air child in Vermont brings undreamed of adventure to reluctant Laurie.

Cheney, Cora. The Mystery of the Disappearing Cars. Knopf, 1964.

A high adventure story of two teenage boys with summer jobs in Vermont and an interest in antique automobiles.

Chickering, Marjorie. Hayseed Summer. Funk, 1963.

A summer in the country helps to change a city boy's attitude toward life and people.

Choate, Florence & Elizabeth Curtis. *Linda Takes Over*. Lippincott, 1949.

The five orphaned Wheeler children, Linda, Olive, Bob, Lois, and Jerry, are living on a farm with their cousins Albert and Cora when they learn that the farm may be destroyed to make way for a new dam.

Clayton, Barbara. Halfway Hannah. Funk, 1964.

A sensitive southern girl is forced to adjust to Yankee New England when her father is employed by a small Vermont college.

Clerk, Jessica. Sukey Johnson Builds a House. McGraw, 2001.

Sukey moves to Rutland to live with her Uncle Wilson, Aunt Nora, and her two cousins. One night she is frightened by a bat, but her cousins reassure her that bats are gentle, and the next day her Uncle builds a bat house.

Coblentz, Catherine C. *Blue Cat of Castle Town*. Longmans, 1949. Repr. Countryman's Press, 1983.

A Vermont town in the Revolutionary War, a kitten and the song of a river.

Conly, Jane. The Rudest Alien on Earth. Holt, 2002.

Having landed on a dairy farm in Vermont, an alien from another galaxy befriends two human children and uses her ability to change into animals to learn about Earth society.

Cooney, Caroline B. Family Reunion. Bantam, 1989.

At a family reunion, Shelley comes to terms with her parents' divorce, her mother's absence, her new stepmother, and being the "stable" member of her colorful family.

Cooper, Peter. Secret Papers of Julia Templeton. Down East Books, 1985.

Ben and Cindy, while researching a history project, discover that their town of Newcastle has no legal right to exist and this discovery puts them in grave danger.

Copp, Peter Campbell. Thunder in October. Apple Press, 1997.

Jonathan Sage, the caretaker's son, discovers there is danger threatening all the people and animals who live and work at the Hildene Estate.

Cormier, Robert. I Am the Cheese. Pantheon, 1977.

Adam Farmer, a drugged teen patient in a psych ward, reveals his story and remembers his past through taped interviews with his psychologist.

Cormier, Robert. The Rag and Bone Shop. Delacorte, 2001.

A star interrogator from Vermont travels to Massachusetts to get a confession from a 12-year-old boy.

LaFleur, Suzanne M. Love, Aubrey. Wendy Lamb, 2009.

While living with her Gram in Vermont, eleven-year-old Aubrey writes letters as a way of dealing with losing her father and sister in a car accident, and then being abandoned by her grief-stricken mother.

Lathrop, West. Black River Captive. Random, 1946.

Narrative of Jethro's search for his father, his capture by the Indians and rescue by a Ranger.

Lindbergh, Anne. Osprey Island. Houghton, 1974.

One summer three cousins discover that if they read the words on the back of a picture they will be transported to an island they name "Osprey Island." They use this spell to visit the island together when two of the children go back home to Paris.

In 1777, fifteen-year-old Phoebe Olcott determines to deliver a secret message to the British General at Fort Ticonderoga, risking her life on the wilderness journey.

Maguire, Gregory. A Couple of April Fools. Clarion, 2004.

At a Vermont elementary school, April Fools' Day takes on a sinister tone when a teacher goes missing and several suspects emerge, among them the teacher's fiancé and a missing mutant chick.

Maguire, Gregory. Five Alien Elves. Clarion, 1998.

On Christmas Eve, a UFO bearing five aliens arrives in Hamlet, VT to free the planet from its evil dictator, a fat man in a red suit and a long white beard.
