Certificate for Public Librarianship



The Certificate for Public Librarianship- one of the Vermont Department of Libraries' (VTLIB) most vital Continuing Education efforts- will be available once again! Information about registering for certification, as well as coursework and workshops for current and future students will be posted on the VTLIB website and listservs in the coming weeks. The VTLIB Library Advancement division is updating materials to provide robust, relevant, and timely opportunities for learning. We hope that you will agree that the educational listings and web-based format that are provided were worth the wait!

The Certificate of Public Librarianship has been directed for the last 25 years by the VTLIB and the Certification Board. The program is designed to meet the Minimum Standards for Vermont Public Libraries which state that the library director, "possesses a library science degree, a Vermont certificate of library training, or has actively worked toward one of these in the past twelve months." This standard refers specifically to the head librarian of a library. To be certified, you much accumulate 150

hours of credits within five years. The credits needed to obtain certification are

If the course or workshop was not taught by the Vermont Department of Libraries credit must be requested from the Certification Board Chair. Four basic course types are required as part of the certification program. These courses are taught by the Department on a rotating basis by location and year. They are:

* Cataloging and organization of library materials


- * Reference
- * Public library administration
- Collection development

Additionally, 10 credits need to be from courses in library information technology.

Credit for workshops will not be given simply for attendance. Each attendee must participate actively and complete all assignments to the instructor's satisfaction. If no credit is awarded, a letter to this effect will go to the participant with a copy to his or her Board of Trustees.

system is still achieving new heights in Vermont. A fun number to remember from this system is that currently there are 119 resources listed in your searches. These 119 resources are not simply 119 catalogs. Between supervisory unions, shared catalogs, and consortia, every time you search for a title in CLOVER you are searching 242 catalogs around the state. Included in these catalogs are academic, special, public, and school libraries. It has truly become a statewide interlibrary loan system and continues to grow by adding more catalogs each week. Take this moment to pat yourselves on the back, because you are all the ones who are making this system a success!

We all wish that kids would use authoritative sources to do their research, but it can be a real struggle to get them to use hard-tonavigate, anything-but-user-friendly databases, especially with Google around.

Did you know that the Vermont Online Library offers databases for kids and teens and that those databases (unlike many we can encounter) are actually user-friendly? *Kids InfoBits* is an authoritative, easy-to-use online resource with age-appropriate, curriculum-related content. Using engaging graphics, the database's simple navigation makes it easy for users to explore content and gain comfort with database searching (a challenge for patrons of any age!). With a

few quick, intuitive clicks, our young patrons can find information on the northern lights, their favorite pro sports team, pioneers in technology, and more.

Articles are also available in audio form, for those students who learn better through listening than reading - and the audio can be either streamed or downloaded for later listening.

Libraries offer many resources to their patrons. Consider surprising your younger patrons by telling them about *Kids InfoBits* - available for free from your library through Vermont Online Library!
