# Suggestions and Tips from Cass & attendees at the 2018 Storytime Workshops

#### **PLANNING TOOLS**

- Plan ahead! Cass planned 10 weeks in advance. She bundled all of her materials for the entire storytime and had them on a shelf, in order of ST date, ready to go.
- Always plan more than you hope to do in a storytime. That way you can be flexible.
- Reflect on what worked/did not. Adjust.
- Join Storytime Underground on Facebook.
- Sur La Lune has great themed storytimes.
- The Department of Libraries has MANY storytime planning books. Put them on hold or give Cass a call and she will help you find what you need.
- JBrary has fabulous ideas for storytimes, videos of songs, stories, etc

- Storytime Katie
- Dorothy Alling Memorial Library Storytime Website
- Some librarians plan monthly themes and each week they do a variation on that theme.
- Use the National Day Calendar to help with theme ideas.
- Have an alphabet year: Each week of storytime features a letter of the alphabet.

#### **FAMILY STORYTIME TIPS**

- Plan for a wide-range of stories, good for the very young and older. Pack in lots of songs, fingerplays, flannel, and movement.
- Make families comfortable by letting them know they can get up, move about, or leave the storytime room if they need to do so.
- Always welcome latecomers.
- Provide chairs with arms for folks who may need them.
- Have a nursing corner.
- Try Kamishibai! Julie from Stowe has one. It's very special.

- Give storytime jobs to older kids.
- Consent activities: "We are going to shake our shakers until Angela says, STOP! Because she is the Queen of the Shakers.
- Use tray (like one that goes under a washing machine) for any kind of messy activities. It's easy to clean and contains mess.
- Sensory Tables—use 2 crates and a dishwashing tub.

# **BABY STORYTIME (0-18 months)**

- Repetition!
- Encourage adult and baby to bond.
- Scatter board books on floor before storytime.
- Story time blanket for babies.
- Scarves and music!
- Bubbles and music!
- Model baby bounces with a stuffed animal or doll.
- Use Big Books
- Promote collection to new parents.

# **TODDLER STORYTIME (18 months-3years)**

- Lots of songs, fingerplays, movement.....
- Same opener and closer for the series.
- Bubbles!
- Shakers!
- 20 minutes or less.
- Language skills are developing unevenly so ask or do physical responses.
- Make sounds.

# PRESCHOOL STORYTIME (3-5 YEARS OLD)

- Same as above but:
  - o Augment stories with non-fiction or fictionalize non-fiction.
  - o Rhythm sticks
  - o Jingle Bells

#### **ADVERTISING/MARKETING**

- Find people who are connected in your community and tell them about your storytimes.
- Post on Library's Facebook page---You can create multiple posts at once and schedule them to automatically appear on your page.
- Canva.com is a great graphic resource.
- Tech Soup
- Local paper
- Mail Chimp Newsletter
- Hoot Suite-multi-platform social media manager
- Post pics and videos often on your library Facebook page. Encourage patrons to like your posts.
- Newsletter—digital and paper.

#### **ACTIVITIES AND CRAFTS**

- Coloring sheets.
- Have a "Stay and Play" playtime session after every storytime.
- Open-ended play: one library has a tent set up and kids make it what they want: a bear den, for instance, if the storytime was about bears.
- Jan Brett masks
- Process art—Check out Pinterest
- Finger paint in a ziplock bag.

## **OPENING SONGS**

- Hello, Friends. Goodbye, Friends. Abby Adams from Platt Memorial uses this one. ©
- We Clap and Say Hello/Goodbye.
- Open & Shut Them.
- I Wake Up My Hands.
- These Are My Glasses.
- Hello, My Friends, Hello!

## **CLOSING SONGS/BOOKS**

- Wave Goodbye book by Rob Reid
- Bread & Butter
- Hokey Pokey

## **Great Songs to Use for Dancing or Shakers or???**

- Good Morning to You (Happy Birthday Song)
- You are my Sunshine (try it with some bubbles at the end of baby storytime)
- Bye Bye....Shaker or Scarves" (Abby Adams from Platt sings this with the kids to encourage them to give back the items.
- They Might Be Giants—Here Come the ABC's album and Here Come the 1-2-3's album.
- Jazz for Kids: Sing, clap, wiggle and shake. The whole album is great! (Cass's favorite)

## **OUTREACH IDEAS**

- Community spaces:
  - Museums
  - Walk-in clinic/med center
  - o Laundromat
  - Famer's markets

- Books to go (themed kits that circulate for daycares/schools, etc)
- Hotels

## **BEHAVIOR IDEAS**

- Each child gets a "storytime buddy" stuffed animal. It's their responsibility to make sure the stuffed animal behaves.
- Have kids help you during the storytime.
- Name the behavior—give it a positive outlet
- Plan ahead
- Understand the needs of kids at this age
- For misbehaving parents:
  - Host a playtime BEFORE storytime to give kids and parents a time to play/talk. This gives parents time to share with each other and gets kids acclimated to the space.
