ABLE Book Club

We have three meetings left this year:

- July 20: **44 Scotland Street, DB64303**, by Alexander McCall Smith

Follows the episodic adventures of an eclectic group of residents of an Edinburgh apartment building. There's overbearing Irene and her precocious young son Bertie, sixty-year-old widow Domenica, twenty-year-old newcomer Pat, and handsome, self-absorbed surveyor Bruce--Pat's flat mate. At her new gallery job Pat identifies an expensive portrait that subsequently disappears. 2005.

- September 21: **The Vanishing Half, DB099791**, by Brit Bennett

Desiree Vignes and her daughter return home to Louisiana in 1968, fourteen years after Desiree and her identical twin sister Stella ran away. The sisters ended up on different paths, and as Desiree struggles with the racial tensions of her hometown, Stella lives her life passing as white. Violence, strong language, and some descriptions of sex. Commercial audiobook. Bestseller. 2020.

- November 16: **The Memoirs of Stockholm Sven, DB105565 / LP105565**, by Nathaniel Ian Miller

In 1916, Sven Ormson leaves a restless life in Stockholm to seek adventure as a miner in Svalbard, an Arctic archipelago.

When an avalanche nearly kills him, Sven flees even farther, to an uninhabited fjord. Years into his routine isolation, an unlikely visitor arrives. Unrated. Commercial audiobook. 2021.

NLS Launches Braille-on-Demand Pilot Project

As part of its braille modernization initiative, the National Library Service (NLS) has launched the Braille-on-Demand pilot project. This project will allow active NLS patrons to request and receive one hard-copy braille title per month, which they can retain for their personal use. Braille titles will be limited to books that are currently available on BARD, the NLS Braille and Audio Reading Download service. At this time, requests are limited to one book per patron per month. Only complete titles will be distributed. Requests for partial titles (for example, volume one of a three-volume book) will result in receiving the entire book. What's New in Audio Books

The Sentence, DB105798 / LP105798, 11 hours 51 minutes, by Louise Erdrich, read by Louise Erdrich
After her release from prison, Tookie takes a job at a Minneapolis bookstore. The store is haunted by the ghost of Flora, a former customer who had a habit of claiming Native American heritage. Tookie must solve the mystery of this haunting while Minneapolis endures a year of upheaval. Unrated. Commercial audiobook. 2021.

How the One-Armed Sister Sweeps Her House, DB106180, 8 hours 43 minutes, by Cherie Jones, read by Danielle Vitalis
In Baxter's Beach, Barbados, Lala's grandmother Wilma tells the story of the one-armed sister, a cautionary tale about girls who disobey their mothers. When she's grown, Lala marries Adan, a

petty criminal whose thwarted burglary of one of the beach mansions sets off a chain of events with terrible consequences. Unrated. Commercial audiobook. 2021.

The Orphan's Guilt: A Joe Gunther Novel, DB105455 / LP015908, 8 hours 9 minutes, by Archer Mayor, read by Tom Taylorson

When John Rust is arrested for drunk driving, an investigation into his past for mitigating circumstances leads to a homicide investigation. Joe Gunther and his team uncover a story of avarice, betrayal, and vengeance surrounding John Rust and his brother as children. Unrated. Commercial audiobook. 2020.

The Stranger in the Lifeboat, DB105576, 4 hours 56 minutes by Mitch Albom, read by Mitch Albom

Adrift in a raft after a deadly ship explosion, nine people struggle for survival. Short on water, food and hope, they spot a man floating in the waves. When they pull him in, he claims to be "the Lord" and says he can only save them if they believe in him. Unrated. Commercial audiobook. Bestseller. 2021.

Those We Throw Away Are Diamonds: A Refugee's Search for Home, DB106093, 12 hours 26 minutes, by Mondiant Dogon & Jenna Krajeski, read by Dominic Hoffman

The author, a Bagogwe Tutsi born in the Democratic Republic of Congo, recounts his experiences after being forced to flee his home for Rwanda when he was a child. Details life in the UN tent cities, his time as a child soldier, and his struggle to forge a better life. Unrated. Commercial audiobook. 2021.

What's New in Large Print

The Coldest Case, LP104928 / DB104928, by Martin Walker

After attending an exhibit on the facial reconstruction of an ancient skull, Bruno is determined to use the technology to help solve a thirty-year-old cold case. But the murder victim's identity is only the beginning. Bruno discovers a suspect was declared dead, and Parisian bureaucrats become involved.

The Book of Hope: A Survival Guide for Trying Times, LP105482 / DB105482, by Jane Goodall

A renowned naturalist, in conversation with co-author Abrams, talks about the need for hope in dark times. She outlines her own four reasons she continues to have hope: the amazing human intellect, the resilience of nature, the power of young people, and the indomitable human spirit.

French Braid, LP14953 / DB107336, by Anne Tyler

The Garrett family falls apart over the decades. Beginning in 1959, Mercy would rather be creating art than keeping house for her husband, Robin. Their teenage daughters, steady Alice and boy-crazy Lily, could not have less in common. Their youngest, David, is intent on escaping his family's orbit, for reasons none of them understands.
