

We are pleased to announce that Vermont's very own State Librarian, Jason Broughton, has been selected as the new Director of the National Library Service for the Blind and Print Disabled (NLS) at the Library of Congress.

Prior to joining NLS, Mr. Broughton was the first African American to serve as Vermont State Librarian. In this role, he engaged in strategic planning for the Department of Libraries and established a long-term vision for the State Library. Previously, Mr. Broughton held numerous positions at libraries in South Carolina and Georgia.

Mr. Broughton earned his M.S. in Library and Information Science from the University of South Carolina, a M.S. in Public Administration from the University of South Florida, and a bachelor's degree in Biology from Florida A&M University. Please join us in welcoming Jason Broughton to NLS!

Crossroads by Jonathan Franzen, LP17730

December 23, 1971, Chicago. Each member of the Hildebrandt family seeks a freedom that the others threaten to complicate. Russ Hildebrandt, the associate church pastor and father of three, is on the brink of breaking free of a joyless marriage unless his wife beats him to it.

The Arbornaut: A Life Discovering the Eighth Continent in the Trees Above Us by Meg Lowman, LP104556

Biologist presents her experiences researching forests in Australia, the United States, Scotland, Malaysia, India, and Ethiopia. Discusses the work she does as a field researcher, the role of trees and forests in combatting climate change, and the different types of arboreal ecosystems.
