Summer 2023 featured libraries at farmers markets and at the Northeast Organic Farming Association's <u>pizza socials</u>. There were opportunities to get a free pass to the Champlain Valley Fair by reading books, cook s'mores in a solar oven, play giant lawn games, and listen to storytelling around a campfire. A whole month of Solar Science Saturdays gave kids a chance to see sunspots and safely view the sun using equipment from the Department – a prelude to the upcoming solar eclipses that will undoubtedly inspire educational and fun programs at Vermont libraries. These kinds of activities often do not require participants to have a library card, but with a card, print and digital materials and more become available. 
Continuing education staff from twenty-nine states met at the beautiful Tennessee State Library for three packed days of presentations, interactive activities, and sharing highlights and challenges from each state. This group meets online monthly but being in-person for the first time since 2019 made for an extra lively exchange of ideas. Highlights included a presentation on responding to book challenges from John Chrastka, founder and Executive Director of EveryLibrary, and a presentation on instructional design and working with adult learners from Julie Edwards, staff at Niche Academy. Hearing what training and formats are successful in other states is always helpful, and it was also great to share about some of the work going on in Vermont, such as the Working Group on the Status of Libraries in Vermont and the growth of the Department's Certificate of Public Librarianship program.

Other high points: a tour of the state library, which is simultaneously huge and stately but also warm and welcoming, indicated by the steady flow of Tennessee citizens coming in to use the space. Lunch time featured library-related or adjacent presentations, including a fascinating one about the <u>Vanderbilt Television News Archive</u>, a collection of television news broadcasts from national networks going back to 1968. A notable takeaway from a session on improvisation (which the presenter connected to library training!) was the phrase "choose to be delighted" – applicable in all sorts of ways!

Noteworthy Finds from the Cataloging Desk

Sprouts: To Grow and Eat by Esther Munroe (1979)



The colorful 70's style of this cover is guite attention grabbing and it's surprising that there could be a book with 150 recipes solely focused on sprouts! The author, Esther Munroe Swift (1923-2012), was raised in Montpelier, and moved out of state. but after returning, became a librarian and archivist for the Billings Farm & Museum in Woodstock, VT. In 2007 she received a Lifetime Achievement Award from the Center for Research on Vermont. This volume, "explains the methods and nutritional advantages of growing vegetable and grain sprouts and provides recipes for various dishes, main, side, dessert, salad, and infants" according to GoodReads. Vermont Place-Names: Footprints of History, another title by this author, was the focus of a Brave Little State podcast. The photos in the book were taken by Allan Seymour, who, along with his wife, Sally, were filmmakers in Dummerston, VT. Let this title serve as a reminder to eat your greens!


ABLE Library





Fall 2023 State Employee Book Club



The Department is pleased to announce the title for this year's State Employee Book Club: Last Night at the Telegraph Club by Malinda Lo. Teenager Lily Hu is fully immersed in the life and culture of San Francisco's Chinatown, home to Chinese immigrant families like hers. But as she comes of age in the 1950s, her passion for rockets and space exploration is matched by her curiosity about the Telegraph Club, located in a neighboring part of the city her parents have asked her to avoid. Lily and her new friend, Kathleen, begin to sneak out at night to the club, which hosts performances by Tommy Andrews, a woman who dresses and performs in a traditionally masculine style. Kath and Lily's interest in each other continues to grow despite the very real danger faced by two girls falling in love in 1954. At the same time. McCarthy-era fears about Communism, coupled with ongoing anti-Asian hate, shake the stability of the Chinese community and threaten to engulf Lily's own father.

This title is the Vermont Reads 2023 novel, and by participating in Vermont Reads we received 125 copies of *Last Night at the Telegraph Club*. Planning for discussion sessions is currently underway and next month's newsletter will have the request form for requesting a copy to keep and to sign up for a discussion session.

News from CLIC, the Public Law Library

CLIC (Community Legal Information Center) provides legal reference services to Vermont's general public. Founded in 2015, CLIC is funded by a grant from the Vermont Department of Libraries and is operated by librarians and staff of Vermont Law & Graduate School.



CLIC Book Collection available on CLOVER

To better serve Vermonter's legal reference needs, CLIC's collection of legal self-help books may be borrowed through the state's ILL system, CLOVER. To find legal self-help

books, patrons can do a subject search in CLOVER or access books, arranged by subject matter, through this research quide.

CLIC has an extensive library of NOLO legal titles, which are designed primarily for planning purposes. NOLO is one of the top publishers of do-it-yourself legal books and software. CLIC has supplemented these with more legally specific materials; materials that aim to pick up where NOLO leaves off. That is to say, they provide solutions when patrons are in the thick of trouble. Here are just a couple of examples of what CLIC has recently been able to offer patrons:

- A patron involved in a proceeding to evict her from low-income housing and representing herself borrowed *The Practical Trial Handbook: A Concise and Practical Guide on the Rules of Evidence, Courtroom Procedure and Trial Skill,* so that she would be fully prepared to represent herself during the hearing.
- A patron appealed the dismissal of their employment discrimination claim and borrowed Employment Discrimination: A Concise Review of the Legal Landscape to help them appropriately form their arguments for race discrimination and establishing pretext.
- A patron represented herself in a successful foreclosure action using Foreclosure Defense: A Practical Litgation Guide.

Vermont Supreme Court Justice Paul Reiber noted in a 2020 Vermont Public interview that, on some dockets, over 90% of the cases involve individuals representing themselves. CLIC's enhanced collection seeks to provide Vermont's self-representing litigants with information that can help them successfully navigate the legal process.



Exploring the social and political legacy of the movement, de Guardiola brings new scholarship and context to one of Vermont's darkest chapters.
